

BUDGET DOWN AT BONNY OAKS

Soil Conservation Aids \$510 Decrease

The budget for Bonny Oaks School for the 1954-55 fiscal year shows a decrease of \$510. Supt. Malcolm M. Adamson told the school's board of trustees at its monthly meeting yesterday.

The decrease from \$95,000 last year to \$94,090 for the coming year is because a three-year soil conservation program at the school has been accomplished, Adamson said.

The budget submitted to the trustees still is to be approved by the County Council.

Adamson said the soil conservation program has helped decrease food expenditures at the school and will be of continuing benefit now that it has been accomplished.

NEEDS GARAGE

Adamson's report said the school "desperately needed" a garage for the school bus and cars. This item, the report said, will cost approximately \$1,000.

Adamson said the institution's finances are such that "we will be able to meet the expense by careful expenditure."

Arnold Campbell will be Student Activity Director at the school this summer, the report said.

The school graduates four students this year, all of whom plan to continue their education, Adamson said.
