# BONNY OAKS NEEDS BOOKS

## Grand Jury Asks Help of Citizenry

The foreman of the Hamilton County grand jury said today an inspection of Bonny Oaks School revealed that some \$500 worth of books "is keeping the school from meeting state standards"—and the grand jury is appealing to citizens to "join in a public subscription" to raise that amount.

W. R. Goudelock, grand jury foreman, told The News-Free Press: "Yesterday we made a routine grand jury inspection of Bonny Oaks School and Silverdale.

"We found both places to be in excellent condition. However, we discovered that approximately \$500 worth of library books is keeping the school from meeting state standards.

"They have some books, but generally they are very old and unattractive. We understand they need more books and they seem to be very much concerned about it."

### BOOKS NEEDED

Goudelock informed Supt. Sam McConnell of the grand jury's proposal. McConnell said:

"I agree with Mr. Goudelock that the books are needed there. We have two other schools that need library books, but steps are being taken to provide them. These other schools can rely more on help from their patrons."

Supt. McConnell added: "They maintain small libraries at the dormitories, but I agree that the books should be provided for the Bonny Oaks children at the school."

Goudelock said it was not the grand jury's desire to put pressure on anyone, but "to help these children get the necessary books."

He asked that checks or money orders be sent to Miss Sarah Tipton, director of county-wide libraries.

The grand jury foreman said, "There also seems to be need at the school for some new dressers and dressing tables. Some of the furniture looks pretty shabby." He said the school room equipment "has been improved immeasurably."

Goudelock was high in his praise of the schools' teachers. "They are unusually enthusiastic and apparently love their work," he said. "The children are neat and clean and seem to be very happy."
